For those who have not done so already, you need to check out the "ArriveAlive!" podcast interview featuring our own Don Eilenberger: "The Motorcycle Answer Man." It is genuinely entertaining and informative. The interview covers a vast range of interesting topics, including Don's early introduction to motorcycles and wrenching, bike safety modifications, travel and safety philosophies, stories from the road, and more than you could ever want to know about deer. During the podcast, the interviewer raised the question of how riding could be relaxing, calming, or cathartic despite the effort it takes to constantly have your guard up and manage potential unsafe situations and the nervousness that the process might entail. I am paraphrasing, but the author was seeking Don's answer to how you draw a balance between the two. Don's response was on-the-mark that the skills and that constant awareness become second nature, and emotion (such as being nervous) does not play into this awareness.

This discussion between Don and the interviewer

reminded me of similar questions raised by my family and friends when I explain that riding is one of the best things for my mental health. I find riding a great stress-reliever and something the clears my head and rejuvenates my spirit and soul. This to my friends and family seems counter-intuitive, especially in New Jersey, where threats from other drivers, poorly conditioned and congested roads, and deer are just some of the many hazards that a rider needs to be fully focused on.

I find my answer in the similarity between the headspace (state of mind) involved in riding and my mindfulness meditation practice. My practice of Mindfulness meditation, which I often perform while walking, involves being fully aware of everything in my surroundings as well as observing everything that is going on in my head, including the cacophony of voices trying to get my attention, but without making any judgments or taking action on those voices.

This is very similar to the headspace when I ride. I constantly take in all I can, including assessing dangers and mitigating options, but do it in a non-emotional state and without judging a situation in terms of fairness or reacting emotionally to the bad behavior or incompetence of others. Inconsequential distractions, whether physical or mental, are observed but not given much thought or credence. Riding for me is calming and cathartic in that it is the one thing I can do during my day, where I can give complete attention/focus to a single activity. It takes less effort to provide intense full attention to a single effort than to manage and juggle the multitude of things that pull at our attention. This has become my "second nature."

I would be interested in where your "headspace" is while riding. Please hit me up at the club meeting with your thoughts.

Elections are forthcoming and will be discussed during the next meeting. As Don discussed during our last meeting and within the previous Newsletter, he is looking to hand off his role as the editor of the Newsletter. We need someone to step up. I know Don will provide a great transition. Bill Dudley has kindly volunteered to split the role with someone.

## That time of year – take care!

The deer are horny.. avoid dawn and dusk. From various newspapers:



A motorcyclist died early Monday morning after he crashed into a deer that was crossing a Bergen County highway, officials said.

The 58-year-old motorcyclist was ejected and landed in the middle of the roadway of the east-bound highway after hitting a four-point buck shortly after 5:30 AM, responders said.

He was then struck by at least one vehicle and was later pronounced dead at the scene just past the Margaret Street overpass near Teaneck High School, they said. The motorcycle landed on its side near a bus shelter further on up the road.

The crash remained under investigation Monday evening by the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office Fatal Accident Investigation Unit and Bergen County Sheriff's Office.

# Car Show @ Van Sant -Club Ride

Saturday Oct 16th, we did a KSU (kick stands up) at the GSP CheeseQuake parking lot at 9. Our destination: Car/Truck/Motorcycle show at Van Sant Airport in PA. It's not far; the GPS calculates 55 miles however there is no direct route. Consistent with my riding approach in life, the route was high speed to get there... followed by meandering back.

Four of us started the ride from Cheesequake: Paul Cooke, Ed Gerber, Henning von der Wroge, and me.

Our route was predominately 4-laners; I-287, Rt 22, Rt 202. At Flemington we hit Route 12 to French Town crossing, and then River Road south and several back roads to Van Sant.

As we approached on back roads the traffic increased substantially with antique and classic cars not providing much of a break for us to merge into the stream of traffic. About 1/3 of the airport access road and parking places were filled when we arrived. When we left an hour later Van Sant's access road was completely filled with multiple rows of vehicles. Maneuvering out on the narrow paved access road was a challenge with people thinking they owned the center of the road.

What I liked was the great variety of classic and unusual cars/trucks/bikes. There were no areas set aside for different classes of vehicles. They just parked them side-by-side as they arrived.... a simple approach which drew people to view the entire airport layout. Several airplanes were parked on the grass field and they even offered rides. There were several cars that I had in my youth (e.g., Olds 442, Ford Model A, Chevy II) or that I always dreamed about.

Other club members arrived although the four of us didn't actually see them. Bill Dudley, Brian Strope, and Larry Edelman. An adder to the trip was that both Ed and Henning picked up FluffyButt points with their picture next to the Van Sant/airplane entrance sign.

Brian met us at the Skylands Airport Café where we enjoyed an excellent lunch and secondary-road ride back toward home. The route back took us from Sky Manor to Hopewell to Princeton and east. As we got closer to Englishtown, Brian peeled off to head home (Chesterfield NJ), then Henning, then Paul. Ed and I made it all the way to the GPS end point on Route 33 Adelphia... where we finally separated.

Overall, for my part of the ride, I covered 151 miles over 7 hours.

## A Late Summer Moped Ride

A 2,943 mile ride around the Great Lakes. I loaded up the scooter on Sept.10th and left Jackson at 2:30pm, hoping to get a couple hundred miles under my belt. I slabbed it on the PA turnpike to 476 north and got off at Jim Thorpe, PA. Then I headed west to Lewisburg, PA.

It was time for Happy Hour so I asked where to get beer and she nicely said you are in a dry county, but you can buy beer in Wal-Mart. I politely asked where it was. She looked at me like everyone knows where Wal-Mart is, just take 15 south you can't miss it.

The next day I was off to Cleveland to stay with my College Roommate and his wife. The room was free but the dinner cost me!

The next day I was off to Michigan. Boy did I misjudge the distance for the day. It turned out to be 530 miles. My donkey hurt that night.

Somewhere near Ludington I hit a monster thun-

der cell. The down drafts where tossing the scooter all over. I spotted a bridge in the distance, so I thought it best to wait the storm out under there. But before I could get there the hail started. That \$hit hurts even at 40 miles an hour.

I'd heard a lot about the maneuverability and handling of the GS given the low center of gravity the boxer engine provides and have to say its a great feeling. I like all types of riding, as long as I'm moving. I usually just go out looking for the road I haven't traveled on yet and try to get myself lost. If I find a tavern off the beaten path to stop and have a bit to eat that is a bonus. I look forward to riding with the group!

#### O-F-F #1!

We all have added "accessories" to our bikes – things that supposedly make riding more enjoyable, more fun, or safer. However, for us motorcycle enthusiasts, "farkle" is a much more often used term than accessory – if you talk farkles, you talk motorcycles... Rider Magazine offers this definition:

Farkle (n): A modification to a motorcycle that satisfies the following criteria: creates "bling," serves a purpose (the usefulness of which is in the eyes of the farkler) and is most likely expensive. Often used among touring riders to denote or convey status amongst their peers.

Farklers support the economy. We might even consider an annual election of the NJSBMWR "Top Elite Farkler" to honor his/her commitment

to the survival of the motorcycle accessory industry.

With this being said, I do have a couple of favorite farkles, and I will share with you over time what and why. As I hope that some of you may join me in this undertaking, I will call these articles for our newsletter "O-F-F!" – Our Favorite Farkles

Here is O-F-F article #1, for the category "Safety Farkle". In fact, this farkle was free to me, as it was given to me as a Christmas gift last year from my very thoughtful wife. Those are the best farkles.



This farkle is "Brake Free" – a detachable and very bright helmet brake light which works autonomously from the bike or your phone. My wife had watched a Shark Tank episode with the young inventors promoting their development. Two sharks went for it, Mark Cuban and Robert Herjavec, and the rest is history... The Brake Free light mounts to the back of the helmet and has its own battery (capacity and weight of a smartphone battery) and built-in sensors that detect deceleration to trigger the bright LEDs.

I often communicate 80 daily miles on the GSP and feel that I am better respected by the cages when I use the Brake Free light. The helmet brake light sits much higher than the bike's brake lights, increases the visibility range significantly. The helmet brake light starts flashing when slowing down, even without me using the brakes of the bike.

I have two helmets and have a mount on both of them, so I can move Brake Free from one to the next. The weight is 7 oz – barely making a difference and not an issue at all for me. The battery of the light is charged via Mini USB cable. The website gives 8 to 12 hours of battery life per charge. I usually charge each night but I have used the lights for three commuting days in a row, without running the battery empty.

When you turn Brake Free on, the lights flash and the number of blinks tell you the status of the charge (3 blinks equals more than 75% charge, one blink less than 35% charge). There are three different modes, from a most energy-conserving "stealth" mode to a "highest visibility" mode.



Both my helmets side-by-side, with Brake Free moved from one to the other.

The Brake Free comes with a single mount which is attached with double-sided high strength adhesive to the helmet. I bought extra mounts (sold in sets of 2) to be able to move Brake free from one helmet to the next. The mounts are tapered, the bottom is wider than the top. I have switched the lights between helmets many times and not experienced issues.

#### **Brake Free mount -->**

I have used the lights for eight months now, and can only report good things other than having to wait to get it shipped. I just checked the website (www.brakefreetech.com) and they are "temporarily out-of-stock".



This also happened when my wife bought it and it took about three months for the light to arrive but there were email updates along the way. Current pricing is \$152.99 for the light with one mount, extra mounts are \$11.69 for a set of two (I have no affiliation with these guys and no financial interest).

Given what we spend on other farkles and the safety improvement, I think this is a good deal.
