

BDR Film at CCBMW

BDR for those not familiar is the Back Discover Routes organization. It is an adventure-based group that creates outstanding off-road rides all over the United States. See https://ridebdr.com

BDR is a non-profit organization like MOA, RA and most local clubs. Their rides start

with months, if not years of research on the best route from point to point within a region. In the past they've created, videoed and published routes in WA, CO, IA, NV, UT, AZ, NM, MA (mid Atlantic, several states), CA (south), NE (North East), and WY.

This year's route being shown at Dealers and other selected sites is nearly 1000 miles across Wyoming. Their routes cross public roads and lands (not private property) and over paved and mild dirt roads. But many of their routes are on mountainous fire roads, rough dirt roads and trails. The routes, downloadable to your GPS, also identify "expert" rough terrain/trails.

As BDR's videos show, only 8-10 riders do the ride for video purposes. Their films EX-CELLENT with professional-looking video and pictures, taken from in-front, behind, and above (a lot of drone videos), BDR provides a video trailer on their website, full video, free tracks, interactive maps, photos, as well as camping, hotel, food and gas information. Packing lists, discovery points and FAQs for each route are included. As time goes on, they publish Route Updates to insure the latest information is available.

Cross Country BMW at Metuchen was well prepared on 2/17 (Thursday evening). About 150 were in attendance. Club members who were there included Joe Karol, Dan Thompson, Henning von der Wroge, Jim Thomasey, and me. Their show room was packed with bikes, upstairs and down. (It looks like they are set for great spring/summer sales.)

The Wyoming film lasted over an hour. Hardly anybody moved once the BDR film started except for a few of us who flinched and groaned as a rider fell or crossed a particularly difficult bolder-ridden or rutted path.

One BDR rider broke his wrist after ¾ of the 1000 mile, 10 day ride. After finding a local person with a truck, he and his bike were transported out to the end-point. That left 7 others finishing the ride (4 men and 3

women). By the way, the 3 women rode BMW R1250GSs... small stature women on big bikes.

You could tell that ALL the participants were experienced off-road riders however it was noted that one of the women took training at the BMW Performance Center to prepare for the ride.

Peter loves his bikes; we now have a garage, but he still keeps one in the house

When I first met my husband Peter, he lived in a flat and kept a large, powerful motorbike, a Kawasaki Z1, in the hall. Trying to squeeze past it with shopping was a nightmare. Then there was a smaller vintage bike, called a Gilera, in the living room and another huge bike, a Ducati, in the bedroom. I was surrounded by them.

We recently bought a house together with a beautiful garage and I thought: great, the bikes will be happy and comfortable there. But then a storm approached. Peter began to get agitated and worried that a branch would crash through the roof and damage the bikes.

Before I knew it, the Gilera had snuck into the house again. He said it would only be there for a few days. But after the storm passed it was still there and ended up staying for weeks.

A few months later, we got a puppy. It started biting everything – that's when Peter finally returned the Gilera to the garage.

I think the only reason he did it was to protect it from the puppy, not because I wanted it gone. After it disappeared I felt joy. I thought: I'm not going to trip over it or find bits of it in my kitchen. I often say Peter loves his Gilera more than he loves me. He's had it since he was 16.

Peter loves to stick bits of his motorbike into the dishwasher, which I find alarming

The two bigger bikes stay in the garage, but once the puppy stops biting, Peter wants to bring the Gilera back into the house. But it creates a mess. I've had a lot of stains on our carpets and flooring.

One time, Peter hung lights around one of the bikes to make it look like a nice art display, but something happened and he burned a hole in the carpet. We've also bought a posh dishwasher –

and Peter loves to stick bits of his motorbike into it, which I find alarming.

I'm not against Peter having his bikes — we've taken several trips with me on the back, and I go to his vintage motorbike shows. But bikes in the house are a hazard. The Gilera really needs to stay in the garage unless there's a real emergency. The bigger bikes stay out entirely

So far, things are moving along nicely; but we're doing the easy stuff first."


Midwinter Reading

If the snow is deep, and the temps subzero, what's to do except curl up with a good book in front of the fire?

There should be a self help group for late night impulse purchasing from Amazon. Thats my excuse, for now, anyway. Only when "Lone Rider" landed on my doorstep, did it occur to me that this would be the third book in my burgeoning new collection of Around The World (ATW) rides.

Which had me wondering (a) how many books are there about circumnavigating on a motorcycle, (b) why do all the rides seem to have their genesis in a British Pub? (c) is in obligatory to write a book about a ATW trip?



A little Google searching shows several more ATW paperbacks. Cue another impulse order on Amazon. "Got 2 Go" by Lea Rieck and "Endless Horizon" by Dan Walsh should arrive sometime next week. There's a very early trip cataloged by Zoltan Sulkowsky and Bob Dolven authored "Andiamo Full Circle" in

2020. I'll ignore Ewan and Charley for the moment. Their trip, after all, was a show before it was a book. Mr Simon, probably feeling somewhat overtaken, now has a sequel and a photo journal. I'm aware of at least one more that doesn't usually come up in the search. Chris Donaldson, who clearly has much better wrists and knees than I, rode a Guzzi LeMans 1(!) around the globe in 1979.

Probably 99% of the ideas for long-ish bike trips are born within arms reach of a beer.
