Happy December and Happy Holidays!

- There may be an increase in traffic, especially during the upcoming holidays and the last thing on shopping-frenzy minds is

motorcycle awareness.

 Pavement that is slightly darker and a little duller looking than the rest of the road surface may indicate the presence of black ice.

Fuse Block on a Budget

I didn't realize the problem until my bike had a starting problem on our Newfoundland trip. When my bike wouldn't start and there were no dash lights or TFT display when I powered ON, then the next steps were to disconnect all my extra accessories to insure they weren't causing the problem. Over the past four years I've had my F850GSA, I've added a few circuits/accessories but didn't realize how many until I needed to unhook all the wires connected to my battery. Typically a new bike has just a main (heavy) red wire for the Positive terminal and a black one to the Negative terminal. On my bike there is also an extra wire on the positive terminal probably for power to the computer/Can-Bus module.

But in my case, while trying to identify the starting problem, I had to unravel a rats-nest of wires connected to both positive and negative battery terminals. Wires for: aux fog lights, front/rear camera system, battery charging connection (which I also use for heated clothes), relay connection for auxiliary stop lights (on my panniers). That's four extra connections to my battery. Disconnecting these while trying to debug my starting problem wasn't a big issue. However, after I got home and after Cross Country BMW repaired my bike, I was challenged to hook all these UP again. Where do all these wires go? Adding four more connections to each side of the battery in addition to the existing OEM connections was a challenge.

I had to find a longer battery terminal screw to connect all the stacked wire connectors.... and then there was a problem with the rats-nest of wires packed around the battery, each circuit with their own separate fuse container.

After struggling to get it all connected as before. I decided to find an alternative. There are three basic solutions: smart, semi-smart, and dumb (my terminology). The smart solution is expensive but provides the most flexibility and guarantees to work with Can-Bus systems. An example product is: Denali CanSmart Controller. This controller provides plug-n-play installation of up to four accessories with dozens of customized settings that can be controlled from BMWs wonder-wheel to control lights, horn, aux light, gps, etc. This system can cost over \$300. The dumb solution for connecting several accessories is a simple 12V fuse block. You can find many types of these on eBay and Amazon to handle a few accessories to many. Most contain physical mini fuses on each accessory circuit and usually one main fuse on the 12v Line coming from the battery. These fuse blocks may or may not have a set of terminals for the negative side of your accessories.

It's important to have negative side terminations to really minimize wiring connections under your seat. This type of fuse block just distributes 12 Vdc all -the -time... it is not switched (turned ON/OFF with your key). One example product is the Centech AP-1 which can handle 5 circuits (\$55). The types of accessories where a simple fuse block makes sense are: charging port, heated clothes port,maybe accessory head lights (if you don't mind having the lights stay ON by mistake), and GPS. A Semi-Smart solution, the one I chose, has a few different products advertised for motorcycles. Characteristics of these include: accessory circuits switched live when your bike switch is turned ON, each circuit is fused separately, one overall fuse on the battery supply circuit, separate ground connections for each accessory, waterproof (or resistant), compact design. A couple products that are advertised in the MOA ON magazine are: Denali PowerHub2 Fuse Block (\$178) and CycleNutz FZ-1 (\$98), The FZ-1 can handle up to 6 circuits and any of them can be set to be switched or constant power; 30 Amp total power. It looks like a nice solution especially if you have needs for both types of accessories.

I chose another cheaper product found on eBay. There is no product name as it shows up under numerous USA sellers. Search for "Fuse Block 12V 20A Waterproof Fuse Relay Box Kit." https://www.ebay.com/itm/195963330947 Or First of all, it is inexpensive at \$15-22. It has 4 switched circuit outputs with a total of 20Amps. Each circuit connection requires two wires, neg and pos. Connections to accessories are via screw-type lugs for both positive and negative accessory wires. Input connections are pos and neg from the battery plus one red wire to your accessory switched bike wire/connection (I eventually found an acc wire on my F850GSA.) Some sellers on eBay say that the unit is waterproof and others don't mention it. (It is not.)

Inside the plastic case is a relay used to switch the outputs ON or OFF, and four mini fuses and LEDs. There is no provision for constant 12V output like the CycleNutz FZ-1. Customer feedback on the product is positive, however one said the "fuses are non-standard … but regular auto fuses can be modified to work." I suppose one could purchase extra fuses if you wanted exact replacements. The unit has an LED light associated with each output circuit. The LED is blue when the circuit is OK and red when blown/disconnected.

Since I only need 4 switched circuits this unit works for me. I will keep my charging/electric clothes circuit separately connected to the battery. Unfortunately, reliability of any of these Smart, semi-smart and dumb units is not known or recorded. Reading the customer feedback is

about the only way you can tell what the issues are. I mounted the fuse block on a plastic plate, larger than the fuse block. The main reason is to secure the individual circuit wires to the plate with nylon ties. This stabilizes the wires since they just insert into the fuse block with lugs and I feel that vibration could loosen them. I mounted the fuse block in the cavity under the rear rider seat. The block comes with about 18 inches of wire to the battery. My battery area now looks clean and unencumbered by a "rats nest" of auxiliary wires.

Nova Scotia & Newfoundland Trip Highlights, Part II

Our excursion to Newfoundland in early September required three ferries. The first from Bar Harbor Maine to Yarmouth Nova Scotia https://www.ferries.ca, the second from North Sydney NS to Port Aux Basques Newfoundland and the third from Argentia NL back to North Sydney. There are eleven ferry terminals in NS and fifteen in NL, which I didn't realize until researching this article. However, our trip planner, Bill Dudley, optimized our travel route using these particular ones. By optimized, I mean we traveled the full length of Nova Scotia from South to North and from West to East.

I've ridden on ferries with my bike before....


Cape May Ferry and Wolfe's Island Ferry (across St Lawrence River to Canada) but never so long a ride as the ones on this Nova Scotia (NS) and Newfoundland (NL) trip. When I was a kid I remember a Bar Harbor Ferry. My parents took my brother and me to NS but don't really remember much about it. As I recall the ferry was called the Blue Nose and lasted 3 or 6 hours or maybe 3 but felt like 6. On our NS/NL trip the Bar Harbor to Yarmouth ship was a CAT ferry that traveled at high speed for 3.5 hours that not only made it fast but comfortably smooth. The Marine Atlantic ferry from North Sydney to Port Aux Basques was about 5 hours but was not a CAT type of ship. The ferry from Argentia NL back to North Sydney was 17 hours. Each ferry was large enough to have cafes and restaurants (and gift shops of course). We were lucky enough to have cellular data service most of the way on the Bar Harbor ferry but the two Newfoundland ferries didn't have WiFi internet service. We lost regular cell service about 90 minutes after leaving port.

Securing our bikes was the same procedure on each ferry. They provided tie-down straps but the straps were dirty enough to use gloves. The straps were made of course material about 2 inches wide and pretty stiff. I'm glad Bill Dudley and Jim Nanfeldt suggested before hand to bring our own straps. Judging from the bright orange color, we must have sourced them at the same hi-tech, motorcycle accessory place (Harbor Freight). The ferries had slippery surfaces in the vehicle storage area. It was sort of oily dirty film. This meant I had to carefully ride to the tiedown area and then when stepping out of my Aerostich suit, I didn't let the Aerostich touch the deck. Then changing boots to sneakers, I looked like I was dancing on one foot.

The fare from Bar Harbor to Yarmouth NS was made in US currency... about \$230 for the bike and me. However thanks to Don Eilenberger, we found a \$50 coupon and eventually got credit. The Newfoundland ferry fares were in Canadian currency which meant with the exchange rate, the \$320 round-trip wound up costing about \$250. The costs for the NL ferries seemed like a bargain since the first one was 5 hours and the second 17 hrs. We shared cabins on the 17 hr Argentia /Sidney ferry that added about \$125 each. Cabins were pretty small... set up with 4 beds and one chair and desk. I joked that we needed to stand up in shifts in order to go the bathroom. The good news was that cabins included a bathroom with shower... not big but adequate. Meals and snacks on board were again discounted at a US rate of approx 75% by the credit card company.

We all were amazed that while in NS and NL, we didn't use ANY cash orhave a need to change currency. All establishments accepted credit cards, even Tim Horton's (like Duncan Donuts) took a credit card when purchasing anything; even a dollar item.
