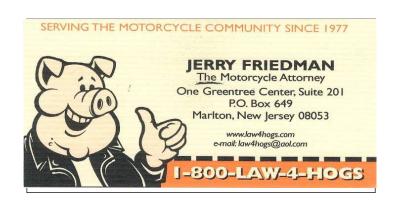

Fontana, Part II

Last month I discussed the first half of Joe Karol's and my trip down to Fontana NC for the MOA Get-a-Way Rally. Our trip was from April 15-22, 8 days. This was the 4th year that we rode there together. During the trip we had only 100 miles (a couple hours) of rain in NC on the way home. Keeping with our overall goal of "secondary roads," we wound up not running the Tail of the Dragon or the full Cherohala Skyway. We did start off on the Cherohala but turned south on a secondary road called Snowbird Rd. I preplanned this route long before our trip. It was a very secondary, but paved, road that bypassed most of the Cherohala almost all the way to Tellico Plains. This type of alternate route interests me greatly. Funny thing is that my Nav VI GPS and BaseCamp software shows this as paved and passable. (I "avoid dirt roads" on my GPS.) However, reality set it after winding down the mountain about 10 miles when we came upon a sign saying "dirt road." It looked deeply rutted and muddy. Given that it had rained the day before, we decided to turn about-face to back track. There were plenty of cross roads before hitting the Cherohala again but all looked like dead ends or dirt. I would like try this route again in dryer weather.

After hitting Cherohala, we headed a few miles west and took another secondary road to the Northeast. This road called Joyce Kilmer, circles Lake Samteetlah back to Rt 129 (the main road leading to the Dragon). Half way around the lake we noticed a one-way 10 mile road leading up to Maple Springs Overlook (3340 feet). Half way up, the sky was clear and views were excellent looking down into the valley. By the time we reached the top, it was foggy and cold, much like we were in a completely different region.

We backtracked down the mountain and finished circling Samteetlah lake. After hitting Rt 129 on our way back to the Fontana Village, we turned off on two more secondary roads that zigzagged their way to the backdoor of the hotel. These roads are very secondary... meaning $1\frac{1}{2}$ paved lanes and plenty of curves that are tighter than the Dragon. This route is about 12 miles from Rt 129, across a mountain to the backdoor of Fontana Village.

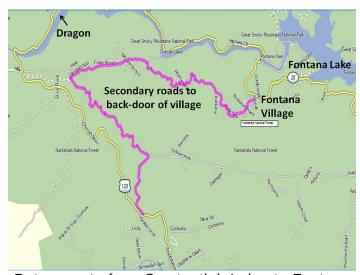
The MOA Get-a-way rally includes Friday and Saturday dinners and gift give-a-way on the second night. Sunday on the start homeward it was lightly raining. However at dinner I heard of an interesting place near Bryson City NC... "The Road to Nowhere." Joe said he had been there years ago but since I hadn't heard of it, I was anxious to investigate. Bryson City is twenty five miles from Fontana. We finally found our way to the road leading to "nowhere". The "Road to Nowhere" was actually very nice, much like the Blue Ridge Parkway in construction; good pavement, two lanes, and with timber railings along the sides... winding up into the Smokies.

We finally got to the end of the road where caution cones and chain blocked our way. Of course, seeing a small gap in the chain anchors, we worked our way past and in another hundred yards made it to the tunnel/end of the road. We could see through the tunnel. At the far end there was nothing but trees... no road, but perhaps trails. A few people were walking through the tunnel but we didn't enter.

Background: In the 1930s-40s Swain County gave the majority of private land to the Federal Government when Fontana Lake and Great Smoky National Park were created. Fontana Lake was developed when the Tenn. Valley Authority (TVA) built a dam on Tuckasegee River. This project was supposed to create electricity for aluminum plants in Tenn and the Oak Ridge National Laboratory. Local people's homes on one side of the newly formed lake were stranded and an original highway to these communities was flooded by the enlarged lake. In turn, the Federal Government promised to replace the sunken highway. They promised that a new 30 mile road would again connect communities and old family cemeteries and lead down to Bryson City. But construction of the new road stopped approximately 6 miles into the park, ending at a newly dug tunnel. Due to lack of budget and adverse environmental impact, construction was never continued. Swain County citizens gave the unfinished road its popular name "The Road to Nowhere."

Our trip home was the same as previous years... North to Asheville, then North again on I-26 to Bristol TN, I-81 North to Winchester, Rt 7 etc to Baltimore and home. Overall, our trip was 8 days and just over 1800 miles. It rained only a couple hours while we were riding.... however it did rain part of the day on Friday but we only rode in the afternoon when it quit. For about 6 miles from Bryson City, the "Road to Nowhere" is a paved much like the Blue Ridge Parkway. The last 100 yards is rough asphalt with plenty of leaves and debris covering the road. A tunnel exists at its end. Hikers can walk through the tunnel but nothing is beyond... just trees.

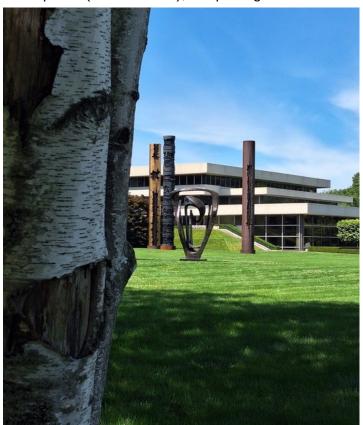
Norton Rally on a Moto Guzzi
